Today marks the final *Westminster Canterbury Weekly*. There have been 204 live update broadcasts since March 17, 2020.

In April, we will kick off a monthly, in-person series, that will take place on the first Tuesday of each month at 11 a.m. Join us in the Sara Belle November Theater or watch live on TV970. In April, our team will share updates about upcoming projects and other news. As we draw close to the end of the Parking Deck construction and Promenade renovation, we will soon begin work on the Vital Living Center, changes to the Avalon Entrance and the addition of elevators to the Courtyard East. In early April, work will begin to prepare for construction of a temporary corridor from the Garden Apartments to the Tower. Please join us to hear the updates and ask questions.

A video showing construction updates from the Parking Deck and Promenade renovation was shown.

COVID-19 Updates

In the past two weeks we have learned of a few cases of COVID-19 among residents and staff. Two employees who work in Mary Morton Parsons Health Center and Engineering tested positive and are recovering at home. A total of two residents of Parsons Health Center Third Floor tested positive in unrelated circumstances and are recovering in quarantine.

As we have throughout the pandemic, Westminster Canterbury follows the latest guidance from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Virginia Department of Health (VDH). Our team has been in close contact with VDH to determine next steps. We complete contact tracing and testing as recommended by VDH. Staff in the affected areas follow additional infection control protocols as needed.

In spite of the precautions we must take in Parsons Health Center, we continue to move forward with updating COVID-19 guidelines as the situation on campus and in the greater community improves. Visitation in Parsons Health Center is welcomed. Beginning this week, we are able to offer one table per dining room in Parsons Health Center for a visitor to eat with a resident. Many of our residents' loved ones are looking forward to using this option. Please practice social distancing and remember to always wear your mask while in the resident's apartment. Everyone who enters Parsons Health Center and Assisted Living must be screened.

We are not aware of any cases of COVID-19 in Independent or Assisted Living. While Henrico County's transmission rate remains substantial, the positivity rate is relatively low. Our programs and services will continue to be open.

Effective immediately, masks are encouraged but not required for residents throughout common areas and in most activities, including the Sara Belle November Theater, Wellness and Pastoral Care. Masks had been required in certain activities, but they will become optional for residents. All employees, contractors, visitors

and others are required to wear masks in all common areas including hallways and lobbies and when attending activities.

Screening Process Changes

We will be changing screening processes beginning Wednesday, April 13. The process will become more automated. We will share more details prior to the change going into place.
